

HEAD OF SCHOOL LETTER 19th AUGUST 2022

Dear wonderful BC Chapman whānau,

'Luke 9 v 23-27

Then Jesus told his disciples, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world and forfeits his soul? Or what shall a man give in return for his soul?"

This Scripture passage is one of those that I always find challenging. There is part of me that actually prefers life in the easy lane. However, there is no doubt that Jesus was clear in his teaching that if we wanted to follow Him, then we needed to be prepared for challenges on our journey in life. True 'aroha/love' is not about self-indulgence or being selfish. It is connected to laying aside what I want for the sake and benefit of others around me and serving their best interests rather than my own. *The reward is worth the price. Jesus followed His call of death to self with the gift of life in Christ. "For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will find it."*

If you wonder if you are ready to take up your cross, consider these questions:

- Are you willing to follow Jesus if it means losing some of your closest friends?
- Are you willing to follow Jesus if it means alienation from your family?
- Are you willing to follow Jesus if it means the loss of your reputation?
- Are you willing to follow Jesus if it means losing your job?
- Are you willing to follow Jesus if it means losing your life?

Although we live in Aotearoa, New Zealand, and we usually don't have to face such consequences as losing friends, our reputation, job or even our life, in some parts of the world there are followers of Jesus who do. May we be mindful, of the myriad of opportunities we have to freely serve others through expressing the love of God in practical ways. Let's not miss them!


AROTAHI MAGAZINE



HEAD LICE

We have received an email regarding a parent's discovery of head lice in their child's hair. Please do check your son/daughter's hair as we know that they unfortunately can be an issue. Head lice love clean hair and can cleverly disguise themselves, so it does require a careful adult examination. Eggs are small and creamy white and tend to stick to the hair. The hair around aNd behind the ear area is often where the eggs are most easily found. If your son/daughter is complaining of itchy hair or is scratching their hair, it is worthwhile taking a close look. All part of the joys of being a kura whānau.
