
# Get2Go

Eight students from Year 9 and 10 competed in the Get2Go Challenge on Thursday, 4<sup>th</sup> August in Rotorua. The Get2Go is an entry level action-packed day of adventure activities. Earning points at each 60-minute challenge in a relay format, the team started the day paddling kayaks on a foggy Lake Okareka before heading to the mountain bike venue at the infamous Whakarewarewa Forest. The orienteering navigation on unfamiliar terrain and indoor rock-climbing challenge also required good teamwork, strategizing and communication. The students had a fun day, with great attitudes and sportsmanship. Well done!



# **Australian Mathematics Competition**

In Week 2, 87 Secondary students and 65 Primary students challenged themselves in the Australian Mathematics Competition. The Secondary students competed online, in a series of 30 questions of increasing difficulty. The Australian Math Competition has been running since the 1970's and gives students a chance to test their problem-solving skills against students from seven different countries around the Pacific. The results will be available in Term 4.

# **Christian Studies Service Trip**

On the 3<sup>rd</sup> - 7<sup>th</sup> August 35 students from year 11-13 Christian Studies classes travelled to Hawkes Bay to be involved in service activities. The students participated and completed many tasks including helping in classrooms at a local primary school, laminating books, cleaning, clearing storage spaces, painting, washing cars, gardening and running lessons with the students.

We also visited eight properties and helped vulnerable people in their homes, including widows, those who had lost loved ones and those who have recently received Cancer treatment. We got to experience the value of serving others in everyday tasks and that by doing so you can make a difference in another person's world for the better.

#### 1. Lost property

We have 3 new lockable Lost Property Bins on campus for easy access. They are located outside R Block just past the Secondary Office entrance and outside the PE offices of the Event Centre. #### 6. Improvements to our disciplinary process

We have been in dialogue with the Ombudsman about our disciplinary process after he was asked to investigate complaints about five decisions dating from 2020. His recommendations, and our own internal review, identified some necessary improvements. Four of the complaints involved exclusions or expulsions and we acknowledge these are significant issues for affected students and their whānau. The Ombudsman indicated that process flaws meant our decisions were unreasonable and that suspension hearings need to consider a full range of factors, not just whether "gross misconduct" was involved. We need to balance affected students' wellbeing as well as other students' wellbeing when making such decisions. We have apologised to the families concerned and we're committed to ensuring our disciplinary process is best-practice. We welcome the Ombudsman's oversight and note that the Ombudsman is always available to any parents with complaints about the Board's actions or decisions. We also welcome any parents with concerns raising them directly with us at any time.
