VISION

To be a Christian learning community of excellence where lives are transformed.

MISSION

To provide a biblically based, Christ-centred education equipping students for effective service and leadership.

As parents, you will be looking for a school that understands the hopes and dreams that you have for your child. You will want a school whose philosophy matches your family's beliefs and values. Bethlehem College was established to provide an alternative choice for parents like yourselves, looking for a caring school environment embracing Christian values and beliefs.

In 1987, Graham Preston, the College's founding Principal, called a meeting of like-minded individuals with the vision to open a Christian school in the Tauranga area. Subsequently, the Christian Education Trust was formed, and land in rural Bethlehem was purchased. A three day quick-build in March 1988, when 400 volunteers worked together during Cyclone Bola, resulted in A Block, the first classroom building for the new Christian school. Classes commenced in July 1988, with a roll of 110 students and 5 teaching staff.

Initially, Bethlehem College was a private independent school, but in 1999 it was integrated into the state system, with its own Special Christian Character formally agreed to between Government and College. Growth has been rapid, with a present roll cap of 1750 students from New Entrants to Year 13, including International students.



A CHRISTIAN COLLEGE AND BIBLICAL LEADERSHIP

Bethlehem College is an evangelical, non-denominational, co-educational Christian school, delivering education with a biblical, Christ-centred worldview, and upholding traditional Christian values and teaching.

Bethlehem College is a special place. Visitors to the College frequently comment on the distinctive atmosphere of peace and tranquillity. Of course, some of this results from the natural beauty of the grounds, with their well established oaks and kauris, green fields and glimpses of the Wairoa River in the valley below. We hope, as you walk through Bethlehem College, that you will sense something of the environment that is distinct from the natural surroundings, and ultimately, more importantly, a place set apart for God.

Education is delivered in a spiritual context, where God is honoured as Creator of the universe, Lord of our lives and the redeeming Saviour of fallen mankind. The Bible is honoured as the truth, and the basis for our outlook and practice. Learning is a process of guided discovery, where we are constantly seeking to apply biblical truth to all our thinking, and the actions and activities that result.

As a state-integrated school, we have a legal contract between the school and the Ministry of Education, entitling us to our Special Christian Character. Families seeking to enrol at Bethlehem College must be supportive of the school's Special Christian Character, preferably demonstrated by membership of, or regular attendance at, an evangelical church.

All students will be given the opportunity to consider the implications of the Christian gospel for themselves, and to discover the life that God has planned for them. Our approach is one of teaching, modelling and example, allowing students freedom of choice and remaining committed to their best welfare.

Teaching staff at Bethlehem College are committed Christians, seeking to help your child achieve a sound, balanced education, permeated by biblical thinking. They aim to apply Christian principles in their classroom culture and teaching practice, and they endeavour to model a Christian lifestyle in their daily lives.

There are aspects of our programme that are explicitly Christian. These include class devotions, scripture memorisation, prayers at assembly and in classes, Christian Living courses and CELP (Christians Embracing Lives of Purpose). The College's desire is that we work together to nurture young men and women of God. Therefore, we invite parents to encourage their children to grow an understanding of God, his love and his purpose for their lives.

The development of strong character and a determination to shape the moral, is very important to us. Aspects of our Christian philosophy that will particularly benefit character growth in students are:

- The balance between the individual and the community
- The place of hospitality and service
- The significance of biblical leadership
- Our understanding of excellence

BIBLICAL LEADERSHIP

As the Bethlehem College Mission Statement affirms, we aim to prepare students for effective service and leadership. Some students have natural leadership abilities, while others prefer to be followers and part of the group.

However, biblical leadership is based on the concept of good influence, and is an attribute that all students can develop, as they understand that they have the potential to significantly influence their world for good. In order to help students develop the power to influence, our programmes include:

- The gaining of knowledge and understanding of the Bible
- The skills to think through issues
- The development of good communication and speaking skills
- Opportunities for leadership within the many sports teams, cultural groups, academic pursuits and service activities
- Other opportunities for leadership in student councils, and as senior leaders and house leaders
- Peer Support leadership for Years 12 and 13 students working in the Junior Secondary School
- Christian Studies in Years 12 and 13

It is our goal to prepare students to become men and women of God—who take an active positive role in their world, whether in study, business, home, church, sports, or government—where they will actively influence their sphere for good.

LEARNING AND THE CURRICULUM

At Bethlehem College, we understand that a key priority is your child’s learning. We are committed to providing an environment and culture where effective learning and teaching take place.

The core of our academic curriculum is a broad general education, focused on literacy and numeracy, and the development of scholastic ability in all students. Sports and the arts form essential ingredients of the curriculum, supporting the school’s goal of producing graduates who are balanced and committed to success. In a world so focused on sport and the arts, we need to develop young people who can be an influence in these significant areas of life for the twenty-first century.

At Primary level, good solid foundations are laid for your child’s future learning and life. The basics in literacy, numeracy, the arts, sports, and the social sciences will be established in a stimulating and caring atmosphere. Foundations for service, leadership and understanding God’s place in their lives are also pivotal.

Growth is the focus at Junior Secondary, Years 7 to 9, with hands-on, high-energy activities to capture the minds of young adolescents. In these years, students are encouraged to manage their own learning with the support of a blended approach using iPads and paper.

At Senior Secondary level, Years 10 to 13, we seek to prepare students for young adulthood, by stretching them academically, physically, socially and spiritually. Students are encouraged to explore their future in depth and to understand how to live in, and engage with, the world. We want to prepare our students for the pressures and challenges of life beyond school, so that they are positive contributors to society, without sliding into conformity.

The College is embracing the world of technology by promoting and nurturing the concept of blended learning. Essentially, using devices such as iPads and laptops enhances learning and can, if used wisely, transform the learning process for some students. These learning tools sit alongside paper and writing skills; they do not replace them. The College believes that digital discipleship must accompany the use of technology, and we seek to engage with our families to collaboratively nurture responsible and God-honouring behaviour online, thereby imbedding our concept of excellence in the virtual, as well as the physical world.





DEVELOPING TALENT IN THE PERFORMING ARTS

The Performing Arts form an integral part of the curriculum at Bethlehem College. As such, the basis of all performing arts activities is founded on the same principles and values as all other parts of the curriculum. It is also where the same key competencies are developed and encouraged with all students taking part. Student Leaders, at both Junior Secondary and Senior levels, are selected for their passion, commitment and leadership skills.

Drama is well established at Bethlehem College, and the facilities in the Performing Arts Centre are world class. Drama provides a variety of performance activities, as well as leadership mentoring programmes and opportunities.

The Senior Stage Challenge is a highlight every year, and Bethlehem College continues to excel in this competition. It creates an environment in which teamwork and commitment are encouraged for the benefit and success of others. The Sheilah Winn Shakespeare Competition is an established tradition at Bethlehem College, and we proudly acknowledge students who have represented the school at a national level, as well as going on to The Globe Theatre in London. The senior school production tends to alternate between a musical and drama, and is strongly supported by the students. Mentoring and student leadership initiatives are seen in Musical Theatre and Dance Ministries. Dedicated and creative students have the opportunity to initiate, direct and manage select performance groups, allowing these students to explore leadership and process drama. Kapa Haka groups perform at official functions, and are an amalgam of both Primary and Secondary. Other highlights throughout the year are talent quests, class-based productions, speech competitions and debating.

There are a number of music groups that students can join. These include several choirs, catering for students from Years 3 to 13. Animoso is our audition choir which epitomises excellence in singing and performance. They have achieved national and international awards.

The Orchestra, Concert and Jazz Bands have achieved Gold awards in regional competitions and perform to a very high standard. They travel throughout New Zealand to compete in National competitions. The Junior String Group and Junior Jazz Band feed into these groups. Chamber groups are available for clarinet, saxophone, percussion, piano and strings, with students regularly taking top places at regional contests. Generally, during the year, these groups together cover 30 public music concerts or performances. Private and subsidised itinerant lessons are available in a wide range of instruments from our committed and skilful teachers.

Although sport is essentially a physical activity, the potential for it to achieve much more is significant. The challenge to the sports teams at Bethlehem College is to honour God in the way they play and conduct themselves – gracious in success, dignified in defeat.

The school offers students a wide range of sporting activities, alternating between summer and winter sports.


Some of the sports codes operate as clubs which rely on active parent participation. The College is very grateful to the many parents and volunteers who manage and coach teams from Primary to Senior students.

Bethlehem College employs a Director of Sport, who is supported by an administration team. These staff support the many volunteers and teachers who, week by week, deliver the winter and summer sports programmes.

The College competes in tournaments, both at the Secondary and Junior Secondary levels, and participates in sports exchanges with other schools.

Student Leaders celebrate sporting success at College assemblies, communicating upcoming events and games, and working with the Sports Council. The student council represents the various codes and organises sports activities at lunchtimes during the week.

The Christian Education Trust, representing our proprietors, has invested heavily in providing amenities and facilities to support a comprehensive sports programme at the College. This, together with training, and the use of development officers in the main sporting codes, ensures that the fitness and skills of athletes is nurtured and sustained.





HOSPITALITY AND SERVICE


MATTHEW 22:37–39



ORGANISATION AND FACILITIES

BETHLEHEM COLLEGE IS COMMITTED TO EFFECTIVE TEACHING AND LEARNING.

The College is made up of:

- Primary: Years 0 to 6, where the foundations are established.
- Secondary: Years 7 to 13, where students are encouraged to experience growth and change. In the latter years students are introduced to speciality subjects which will allow them to explore their potential.
- Bethlehem College Chapman: Years 0 to 8, situated in Rotorua is an integral part of Bethlehem College. Students who attend Bethlehem College Chapman have automatic entry to Bethlehem College in Year 9, as they are already Bethlehem College students. There are dedicated buses that travel between Rotorua and Tauranga daily.

Primary classes occupy A to E blocks, which centre on the B block quadrangle and the Kauri grove. Secondary has its own quadrangles surrounded by double storey blocks, R, T, S, and Q. The two areas of the College are linked by the Centrum, a circular, outdoor mini amphitheatre, suitable for students to gather together, both informally and for more formal occasions. The first building of the school on Elder Lane is the Chapel, standing as a significant visual statement of the College's Christian philosophy and worldview.

Junior Primary class sizes are no more than 25 (smaller at Year 0 and 1), and Middle and Upper Primary class sizes are no more than 28.

At Years 7 to 9, students are placed in classes with homeroom teachers for the core subjects, moving to specialist teachers for other subjects. From Years 10 to 13, there is increasing specialisation, with students choosing their subjects from a wide selection of options.

All Secondary students are placed in a 'House' for pastoral care and for various sporting, cultural and service activities. Each house is divided into K (Koinonia) Groups. Year 10 to 13 students are each allocated a K Group for devotions and school administration. They stay together, usually with the same K Group teacher, for the duration of their time at Bethlehem College.

The main enrolment intakes for new students into Bethlehem College are:

- New Entrants – children who attend any of the CET's early childhood centres are given excellent preparation for the College, although automatic right of entry to the College is **not guaranteed**.
- Year 7 – the number of homeroom classes increases from three in Year 6 to seven in Year 7.
- Year 9 – additional classes are added.
- Years 12 and 13 – the senior years, as vacancies become available, which tends to happen when students leave for tertiary study or employment.

As well as classrooms and the Chapel, Bethlehem College is well endowed with other excellent facilities which will greatly enhance your child's education. Specialist classrooms include computer suites, technology rooms, a well-stocked library, art rooms and a number of science laboratories.

The Bethlehem College Events Centre provides an excellent venue for indoor physical education and sports, as well as an auditorium for assemblies and major events.

The provision of a wonderful Performing Arts Centre in 2009 has allowed us to offer improved opportunities in the teaching of music, drama and dance within the school. The facility includes a 600 seat theatre, a hall, specialist drama and music rooms, and a foyer and full commercial kitchen for hospitality.

Outdoors, students are provided with adventure playgrounds, a primary swimming pool, tiger turf tennis/netball courts, cricket nets, football pitches, cricket ovals, an artificial hockey turf and a rugby field. The nearby Wairoa River is an ideal training ground for rowing and other water-based sports.
