



HEAD OF SCHOOL LETTER 17 NOVEMBER 2023

Kia ora wonderful BC Chapman whānau,

Well, this has been a HUGE fortnight as we have prepared for our kura Production 'Heart to Change the World'. Now this week, the lights lifted, the actors walked across the stage and the storyline began. Set in Psalty's music workshop, with its instruments, Songmobile, Musiquizzical quilt and a range of different instruments in various states of disrepair, we meet Psalty and Harmony, who are the central characters. As it so happens, Romans 12 v 16, is pertinent to our main character Harmony, who experiences an entire change of heart! Within moments, the auditorium comes alive as over 110 tamariki come skipping into the workshop to the surprise of the unsuspecting audience. Dressed in their respective costumes, the room is a blaze of colour and alive with the beauty and richness of cultural diversity. Singing, 'Come into the Workshop', complete with actions, dancing, and a smorgasbord of plates of food for the International Potluck Dinner, audience attention was captured! We had them hooked!

This is much more than a children's production. It is a major community undertaking, in which our tamariki step up to use their God-given gifts & talents to bring a life-challenging, transformational message. It is an opportunity for kaimahi/staff and whānau/parents to work together to support their tamariki through creating props, managing sound, setting stage scenes, designing choreography, producing memorabilia, baking, teaching songs, directing action and encouraging actors, praying for health and for the central message.... it's everyone playing their part so that the entire production happens. This is not the first and no doubt won't be the last time, when I am reminded of the 'interdependence' we are created to have.

We were not disappointed! Every performance was an experience as our tamariki gave their all and the audiences responded with clapping, cheering, whistles of appreciation and even joined in with some of the songs! Upon exit, there were toes tapping, some humming of the tunes they'd heard and time taken to drop into the 'Slice of Heaven Café' to eat a few of the delectable cultural favourites, and to purchase a little memento of memorabilia! You and I can have a heart to change the world for we are His hands, His feet and His voice. Our prayer, yes, you guessed it, is that a decision to be all out committed to following Jesus and expressing our faith, hope and love through service in a broken world that desperately needs to know Him.

Digital Devices for Year 7 & 8 tamariki in 2024


During 2023 a group was set up to look at BYOD devices at Bethlehem College/Bethlehem College Chapman. From the investigation, it was decided that Chromebooks would be introduced alongside iPads as a suitable learning device. The rationale behind this includes the following:

- iPads were initially used due to the range of Apps and the provision of Apple security being beneficial to learning. However, more and more learning resources are web based and can be accessed on any device and an App is not required.
- Chromebooks have a physical keyboard which can help with students' typing skills development, allowing them to be more efficient in the recording of their learning. We have a better chance of growing correct touch typing skills with the presence of a keyboard.
- Chromebooks can be set up with a school account so student's activities can be monitored and good digital citizenship behaviours encouraged.
- Chromebooks have a range of models and pricing. With digital devices you get what you pay for so it is important that the device is suitable for a school environment.
- Both iPads and Chromebooks have excellent battery life that supports a full days learning.
- Chromebooks are a device that can be used for NCEA exams in their Senior years. At the moment, iPads are not supported.

With the need for those entering into Year 7 to purchase a BYOD (Bring Your Own Device), we wanted you to have time to consider which you would like to purchase for your son or daughter's use over their time at BCC & beyond.

The intention is for students to be able to bring EITHER an iPad or Chromebook as a learning device. We will monitor running both systems and after a year assess how it is going and if any changes need to be made. This means that those entering into Year 8 who currently have an iPad **DO NOT** need to purchase a new device. If your son/daughter entering into Year 7 has an iPad presently, then they are welcome to use this.







Measles

Important information from Public Health Nursing Services Te Whatu Ora Lakes

Te Manatū Hauora (The Ministry of Health) and Te Whatu Ora are running a campaign to vaccinate children and young people.

Nick Chamberlain National Director of the National Public Health Unit has directed that Public Health Nursing Teams throughout the country to focus on increasing immunisation rates. This means that all other PHN work must cease for the next few months, as the priority for the team currently is Immunisations and of course any child protection issues. However, we will still provide a service to schools as we able. Please contact 0800 Lakes kids or the PHN for your school.

Early childhood services and primary schools have an important role in protecting the health and wellbeing of the children in their care. Diseases can spread easily when a large number of children are spending time in close proximity, for example, when they are at an early childhood service or school. Immunisation is a proven way of preventing diseases from spreading. (Ministry of Health) and Te Whatu Ora (Health New Zealand) encourages parents and guardians to make sure their children have completed their immunisations on time, particularly before they start at an early childhood service or school. Completing the full course of immunisations provides the best possible protection against diseases such as whooping cough and measles, both for children, whānau and the wider community and the people in contact with them.

As you know, there is a recently we have a cases of Measles in New Zealand. Measles is likely to continue in NZ for months, with travel and school holidays increasing the likelihood of further measles spread.

Safeguarding children from measles is by being fully vaccinated, keeping children and staff who are not protected away if measles occurs at your centre will all help protect others, especially those at risk of complications from disease.

Measles will be very disruptive to the community and we want parents/caregivers and children to be prepared and protected – either by having your immunisation records ready or immunising now if you are not protected.
