


HEAD OF SCHOOL LETTER | END OF TERM 1 2024

Dear wonderful BC Chapman waka whānau,

In the past couple of weeks, I have noticed the significance of having a sense of **'belonging'**. Recently, I read an interesting blog written by a friend of mine who drew comparison between **'belonging and fitting in'**. So, what actually is the difference between these, or is it simply a matter of semantics? The Bible is clear about being 'in the world, but not part of it'. Therefore, we are not **designed** to 'belong' to this world, its culture, or 'to simply fit in'. 'Belonging' is being yourself, 'fitting' in is making changes & usually compromising who you are, & the beliefs & values you have, in some way.

This photo of three special friends running into our kura before school, grabbed my attention. Three unique individuals, made in the image of God, gifted, talented, & connected within their respective whānau/family & our kura/school community. They are connected & have distinct significance & contributions to make. If they simply fit in with each other then, that implies some required adjustment for acceptance & validation is necessary. *How often do we feel the pressure to 'fit in' & to be & do what those around us do rather than to stand up & remain true to who we are & what we believe?* In this current global cultural climate driven by social media, *we are constantly being shaped & deluded into seeking to 'fit in' when we were created to 'stand out'.* By contrast *having a true sense of 'belonging' means knowing who you belong to, who you are & the unique significance & purpose you have.* Having a sense of belonging grounded in the *TRUTH of Scripture* is counter-cultural and enables us to resist those fitting in pressures.

In our whānau/family, we have a context designed by God in which we can be nurtured, intentionally taught, guided, & grow. We are designed for relationship, with God first through His son Jesus, & with each other. This is where a true sense of belonging & secure identity is found. At our Year 7 & 8 Camp at Finlay Park over the past week, 32 rangatahi/young people, lived and repeatedly mirrored 'belonging'. Through knowing complete freedom to be themselves, harmony, peace, cooperation, laughter, fun & a genuine heart to include & to serve others followed. The natural consequences of having a sense of 'belonging' were a JOY for us as adults to be part of. Let's continue in our whānau/kura partnership, guided by the Word of God, to invest in our rangatahi by reminding and encouraging them of who and where their true 'belonging' is found. It is a challenging journey but our rangatahi are worth fighting for!

With 35 of our enthusiastic athletes, we headed to Porritt Stadium in Hamilton early on Wednesday 27th March. The weather forecast was not exactly positive and upon arriving and erecting our gazebo, it was evident that the river of water flowing from the canopy down the slopes and through school bags was going to be an issue. An executive decision to move to the covered Grandstand (for which ALL kura teams were duly grateful), allowed us to stay semi dry most of the time, apart from the occasional deluge, while doing the rotational field events.

Regardless of the variables and at times distinctly unpleasant weather conditions, (ever tried high jumping with slippery ground and a saturated mat....), *not one word of complaint was uttered by any of our rangatahi or our whānau. The word 'resilience' repeatedly came to mind, for it was on display throughout the day.* Our athletic superstars entered the events with sheer determination and loyalty to our kura and the individual and team performances showed the caliber of their character. Whether charging down the 100metre straight, maintaining the tenacity needed for an 800 metre race, being a member of the age relay team, jumping high or long jump, or throwing shotput, **they gave their ALL. To come 2nd to Hamilton Christian kura**, (which is around 10 plus times our size), is no mean feat, and a testimony to our rangatahi faithfully using and developing their athletic talents. **A FANTASTIC day!**

Three of our swimmers qualified, and attended the Central BoP Swimming Sports, on Wednesday 3rd April. Felix & Falcon Chu and Aaren Zhang supervised and managed by Levi Chu, competed in a range of different events. With first, second, third or fourth placings they did exceptionally well.

We honour their whānau who have invested in these boys through swimming lessons, their coaches and each of them for the dedication and discipline that swimming competitively requires on a weekly basis.


FAREWELL BRYAN AND DIANE WALFORD

The Uniform Shop will be open on Staff Only Day Monday 29th April from 10am to 2pm




CORNERSTONE CHARITABLE TRUST - MARA KAI/GARDENING FOR FOOD (FEEDING ROTORUA)


WAKA TAUTOKO/PTA
