


CYBER-SAFETY OUR KIDS ONLINE PRESENTATION

MAKING CHOCOLATE

Our Ruma ono ākonga/students had a great deal of fun making chocolate. Now how you might wonder, is this connected to the curriculum? 

This Newsletter we have an assortment of pictures from across our kura from 5 to 13 year olds.










These **Ruma ono, Year 5 & 6 Summer drawings** are vibrant configurations of whānau experiences which were then elaborated on through poetry.
