The change for Paul was the impact of Jesus. What Jesus did in Paul's life has been repeated in millions of lives over the last two thousand years. The effect of that first Easter is still being seen and felt across the globe. This is a time to stop and recall what makes Jesus such a game changer.

BC BALL


OLD HOLLYWOOD GLAM - 2025 BALL






















ACTIVITIES

GEOGRAPHY

The Year 12 Geography class recently took an overnight trip to Mt Ruapehu as part of our large natural landscape studies. We first put in the hard mahi by collecting data on vegetation and climate conditions at three different altitudes moving up Mt. Ruapehu. The following morning, we woke up early to watch the sunrise and began the day with karakia. Perhaps the best part of the trip was the Taranaki Falls track, where we observed and could identify the unique alpine scrublands and large andesite lava flows. While we have been learning about the Tongariro Volcanic Centre in class, exploring the site in person gave us knowledge and memories to enjoy for years.

'Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms' (1 Peter 4:10).








SCIENCE


