FAITH

As Professor John Lennox says, we don't have to pit science against belief. Science tells us about the world we live in but does not give us an explanation for life itself. The Bible fills these gaps through scripture like 'Thank you for making me so wonderfully complex! Your workmanship is marvelous—how well I know it' (Psalm 139:14), and 'When I look at the night sky and see the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars you set in place, what are mere mortals that you should think about them, human beings that you should care for them' (Psalm 8:3-4).

OUTREACH

SOLOMON ISLANDS

A group of 18 arrived back from the Solomon Islands on Saturday 26th April after spending 2 weeks serving in Honiara. The main base was Florence Young School, near the center of Honiara where we have been visiting for the past 3 years, and many students know us well.

The main service and mission activities were teaching hygiene, literacy and numeracy, teacher professional learning and outreach. We were able to provide resources – First Aid kits, laptops, medical supplies, school textbooks and sports equipment. Though we have a heart to serve and learn, we always come away with such an enriched perspective, living out the phrase "blessed to be a blessing". Connecting with a local Youth group, visiting the World Vision and YWAM bases were great learning experiences.

World Vision in NZ this year are focusing their efforts on the Solomon Islands and understanding what is happening ground level was inspiring for the team. All in all, the learning was rich, God fingerprints were everywhere and relationships with Florence Young School were strengthened.







40 HOUR CHALLENGE

This year World Vision is focusing its efforts on agriculture, young children and food supplies for the Solomon Islands. ANZAC DAY

With ANZAC Day falling in the April school holidays this year, we held our ANZAC assembly on the first Friday of Term 2. Students had the opportunity to support the work of the RSA by giving a donation in exchange for a poppy, which many students wore to the assembly. Continuing a cherished tradition, we were delighted to welcome guests from the RSA - Mr Morton Anderson, the current president of the Tauranga RSA, and Mrs Heather Waldron, an ex-president.

During the assembly, students were reminded through a short video clip of the involvement of New Zealanders in the First World War, with 18,500 losing their lives in the ultimate sacrifice and a further 40,000 casualties. A group of students from drama and Kapa Haka performed a moving drama further demonstrating the realities of war and in particular the involvement of the Māori Battalion in Gallipoli, culminating in a particularly passionate, powerful and respectful Haka. Animoso, conducted by BC student Enoch Tie, performed 'God be in my head', composed by John Rutter. This prayer asks God to be present in all parts of a person's life, from their thoughts and understanding, their actions and words, what is in their heart and ultimately for God to be present when it comes time to depart this earth.

It is common practice to play the Last Post at remembrance ceremonies and we were fortunate to be able to call on the accomplished talent of Y10 student, Arthur Thompson, to play the Last Post and Reveille while our Head Students lowered and then raised the New Zealand flag. The minute silence following the lowering of the flag gave us the opportunity to remember those who gave their lives in service of their countries. Three times the words of Jesus from John 15:13 were shared with the assembly - 'Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends.' Firstly, from a Bible reading by Leila Stewart, then in speeches made by our Head Students, Ezra Vukona and Grace Winiata, and finally by our Principal, Larne Edmeades in his closing speech.

The assembly was extremely honouring of our fallen ANZAC's and those who still serve in our armed forces. Lest We Forget.

ART & DESIGN

Seventy Year 11 Art and Design students recently embarked on a creative and culturally enriching trip to the Tauranga CBD, where they explored a vibrant collection of Māori artworks by a range of influential artists.

The city's public spaces became an open-air classroom, offering students a unique opportunity to engage with both traditional and contemporary Māori visual storytelling. From large-scale murals to intricate carvings and modern installations, the artworks reflected deep connections to whakapapa (genealogy), whenua (land), and Māori identity. Students were encouraged to observe, sketch, and reflect on the artistic techniques and cultural narratives present in each piece.

This hands-on experience provided invaluable inspiration for their own art practice and deepened their appreciation for perspectives in Aotearoa's art scene. The trip sparked meaningful conversations and creative ideas that will continue to shape their learning throughout the year.
