SUBJECTS

ARTS & DESIGN - MĀORI VISUAL ARTS

Bethlehem College recently had the honour of hosting Dr. Johnson Witehira, a leading international figure in Māori Visual Arts. With a Doctorate in this unique field, Dr. Witehira spoke to 60 of our senior Art and Design students, sharing his creative journey and deep cultural insights. His visit was both inspiring and thought-provoking, especially as students are currently exploring the theme of tūrangawaewae – a concept that connects people to their place of belonging.

Students also had the invaluable opportunity to speak with Dr. Witehira one-on-one, receiving feedback and encouragement on their individual art projects. As a token of appreciation, we presented him with a print by Obidiah, a talented Year 11 student. Dr. Witehira was blown away by the calibre of Obadiah's work, praising the depth and skill shown.

His visit was a powerful reminder of the importance of culture, identity, and storytelling through art.









GEOGRAPHY TRIP TO WAITOMO CAVES

As part of their sustainable tourism studies, our Year 11 Geography students visited the Waitomo Caves, exploring both the Ruakuri and Glowworm Caves.

They learned about the local history, cultural significance, and environmental management of these unique natural sites. The trip provided a rich opportunity to explore how tourism can be managed responsibly in a delicate natural environment.

Beyond deepening their understanding of natural landscapes and sustainability, the experience reminded us that creation is not just a natural wonder—it is a divine gift.
