PRODUCTION UPDATE

Our Production performances will be during the week of the 17th-21st November with the rehearsal week being the 10th-14th November. Right now these dates appear to be far away in the distance, close to Christmas, however, experience teaches us that we will be there faster than we expect. We do want to be well prepared. The message of our kura Production is 'Antshillvania' & is the story of The Prodigal Son. The story is situated in an 'ant' town where the lead character Antony, gets up to all kinds of 'antics' because he wants 'freedom' to explore the world beyond Antshillvania. Needless to say, that does have some consequences he didn't anticipate, despite the fact that his father the Commandant had tried to give him wise advice. Please pray for our Production as the message is centred on 'Grace & Gratitude', it is the Gospel message in a nutshell.

Having undertaken auditions towards the end of Term 2, the casting of the major speaking parts was announced in the final week of the term. Scripts were placed in the hands of our lead characters so over the holiday break they have begun to learn their lines. As we progress through Term 3 auditions & the casting of the minor character parts will be decided. Practices will be held throughout the school week with two lunchtimes & an afternoon set aside for this. The words of the songs have been printed & we will be practising those.

Currently we are looking at a way in which you might even be able to practise them in your car/van travelling to & from school! If you haven't already noticed, when we do ANYTHING here at BC Chapman, the whole whānau ends up involved. By the time we get to presenting the Production you will be able to go on stage too!!!!

The 'ant' antennae have arrived courtesy of 'Temu' & Whaea Becs who spotted the opportunity! We will be working our way through the costuming for each child. There are **many ways** you can support our Term 4 Production, the first of course being ensuring your son/daughter has black leggings (right to the ankle), or black track pants (no other writing or colour on these) & a long sleeved black skivvy or long sleeved black T-shirt. The black clothing will be underneath other costuming e.g. overalls for 'paint-ants'; or shirt & shorts & tool belt for builder-ants etc. K-Mart, the Warehouse & 'Temu', are all apparently handy sources for black clothing needs.



If you are a sewer & would be willing to sew some 'hoods' for our 'ants' then please contact Mrs Stevenson in our kura Office or email in your availability. Sewing could happen either at your home or here at school as we do have sewing machines available here. Coffee, company, chat & food is guaranteed here at school too! Other needs include assisting with make-up in dress rehearsals & prior to stage performances. Ticket selling, advertising, baking & serving Café food & drinks for the evening performances, costume sorting, selling Production memorabilia & preparing other 'Waka Tautoko' wares (jewellery, candles, shopping bags, etc.) pre-Christmas in time for gifts, are further ways you can help. Our kura Production is our main 2025 Fund-raiser & in 2023 we generated almost \$10,000 through our ticket sales, Café & memorabilia.


