
Kia ora wonderful BC Chapman whānau,

The Scriptures we have been learning are an apt reminder of the power of the words we speak and their effect on others. As people, we have this amazing gift of language and the ability to communicate what we think, feel and are learning. As we approach the final week of Term 3, and have had a few rainy days to navigate, the words that are spoken can reflect the prevalence of those BIG feelings over a more reasoned approach. As parents, we would all agree that when feelings completely take over, any kind of logic goes right out the door, off the property, and sadly out of the country! Some space to enable the feelings to settle is indeed step one.

There have been a few moments of frustration between tamariki who have felt the game wasn't being played exactly the way they felt it should be. As we have walked tamariki through the breakdown and fall out of relationship, it has been a timely reminder of how significant healthy relationships are. Even adults need the willingness and skills to sort conflict and restore relationship.

Similarly, it is important to have some clear rules when playing a game and a personal willingness to accept and play by them. Changing rules mid game would be much like shifting the goal posts on the netball, hockey, basketball, football or rugby court, turf or fields. We can laugh at the thought of doing that, however when it comes to playground or board games, we can all be sorely tempted to make our own rules especially if 'winning' is at stake.

We are grateful that God graciously gave us clear guidelines to live by relationally, ones that stay the same, no matter what. The 10 Commandments which Moses received at Mount Sinai were neatly summarised by Jesus when HE told us that we are to "Love the Lord our God with all our heart, mind soul and strength and love our neighbour as yourself" (Luke 10 v 27). Living by following these, enables us to work through our differences and to live at peace with one another, and heighten our awareness that a person matters more than winning a game at all costs. It is truly beautiful when children genuinely own personal responsibility or their actions, seek forgiveness and humbly restore relationship. The fruit of love and peace returns joy and is truly delicious!

This is a karakia/prayer we often say at our kura to thank God for the kai/food we have in our lunchboxes. Once again

WHĀNAU/ FAMILY HOLIDAYS

Although we do understand that trying to go overseas to connect with family or for a holiday is less expensive if done during School Term time, we are required to remind you of the Ministry of Education stance on School Attendance. We submit our attendance figures on a weekly basis. Given the realities of Covid in 2020/2021, and the difficulties with return to school, and the subsequent learning gaps resulting from absence, the Ministry has taken a very strong stance on 'Justified' and 'Unjustified' absence. Any holiday taken in school term time is viewed and marked as directed by the Ministry as 'Unjustified'.

May we ask that any absence outside of School holidays is directly communicated by email to Mrs Warnes, to Mrs Stevenson in our Kura Office and to the kaiako/teacher/s that your child/children have. Our teachers plan their Teaching and Learning Programmes with meticulous care and unexpected absence for prolonged periods does create learning challenges as the child/children who are not present will have missed curriculum content which does then impact their progress.

We recognize that family holidays are deeply significant and that the gains cannot be measured and ideally booking them 1 or 2 days either side of the holidays is optimal. Informing your son/daughter's teacher well in advance allows their teacher to plan accordingly and to minimize impact on their learning.





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
ART EXHIBITION

This week's exhibit is a rich plethora of colour, texture and form. **Tukutuku patterns** took our **Year 7 & 8 rangatahi/young people** on a whole journey of learning exploration. This then involved stitching and patterning which opened up the learning of new skills, all of which were thoroughly enjoyed.















Tukutuku is a type of weaving using reed lattice work rather than threads to adorn the inside walls of wharenui/meeting houses on a marae. The tukutuku panels are placed in between the carved wall slabs in the wharenui. Similar to carvings, they communicate meaningful connections using visual symbols.

Traditional tukutuku is made from kākaho (toetoe reeds) placed vertically side by side with kaho (horizontal wooden laths) lashed in front of them. The kaho are coloured red or black and on this framework coloured patterns are produced by thin strips of native grasses laced round both the kākaho and the kaho. Each tukutuku design is named. Poutama is a common design and refers to education, progress and ascension. A whole panel covered in white crosses is called purapurawhetů (star seeds) while vertical bands of white crosses are known as roimata (tears) and a

MT TARAWERA ERUPTION

Ruma rua have been learning about the Tarawera Eruption and the devastation it caused by burying the local Te Wairoa village in 1886. The children learned about the Science of Mount Tarawera's eruption, the social impact, the environmental consequences, and the emotional toll. They are learning that God is their refuge in times of need. They read a fictional story of a Christian family who lived through the eruption. Comprehension questions initiated discussion about how Christians are to navigate trouble with prayer and an unwavering faith in Jesus. We give thanks to God for Mrs Jean Montgomerie for her fun and warmth as she encourages the children in their learning.




